1998 CONFERENCE KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Darlyne Bailey, Ph.D., is dean and associate professor at the Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. She has secondary appointments in the Weatherhead School of Management and the Mandel Center for Nonprofit Organizations.

Dr. Bailey is a member of Leadership Cleveland Class of 1997. She is also a Group XIII Fellow in the W. K. Kellogg National Leadership Program where she is exploring the role of spirituality in building community.

Dr. Bailey's research and publications focus on community-based consortium development, workplace diversity and participative organizational redesign strategies. Most notable is her work using participatory action research methodology. Her work with the Healthy Family/Healthy Start and Hope VI Projects in Cleveland have received recognition both locally and nationally.



Dr. Bailey is currently conducting research on the development and evaluation of local and international collaborations. Dr. Bailey obtained her M.S. in psychiatric social work from Columbia University and her Ph.D. in organizational behavior from Case Western Reserve University.

In addition to being the first African American dean at Case Western Reserve University, Dr. Bailey was the first woman and African American to be awarded the 1994 George Washington Kidd Award of 1836 from Lafayette College. This award is given to an alum to acknowledge distinguished professional achievement. In May 1997, Dr. Bailey was elected as an alumni trustee to the Board of Trustees at Lafayette College. In November 1997, she was invited to be a Fellow in the prestigious Salzburg Seminar in Salzburg, Austria. This seminar brought together non-governmental organizational (NGO) leaders from forty-four countries to spend an intensive week focusing on the roles and responsibilities of NGOs as we enter the next millennium. She has also been included in the 1997 Marquis Fifty-first Edition of Who's Who in America.

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
